- In his early days in Basel, Yann played for Concordia Basel
- Married to Alina, father of two daughters

- Last 5 penalties against Sommer from the spot (except in penalty shootings) in international matches have not been scored
- Is the number one goalkeeper since Diego Benaglio has retired after the World Cup 2014 in Brazil
- Is a passionate guitar player and has his instrument often with him while on international duty
- Participant of the UEFA Under 17 European final tournament in 2005 (did not concede a goal until the final in 4 matches)
- Finalist at the UEFA Under 21 European championship in 2011 under Pierluigi Tami (now national teams director)
- "Player of the year" in 2016, 2018 and 2021

- In 31 matches during the season 2018/2019, he played under six different managers (Tramezzani, Gabri, Jacobacci, Wicky Frei, Koller) for 3 different teams (Sion, Basel, Lugano)
- Had two shoulder surgeries within 1,5 years starting from March 2017
- Once scored a goal in the UEFA Youth League against Arsenal from 60 meters
- His family changed its name in August 2018. When Eray's grandparents had arrived in Switzerland from East Anatolia, the then-registered name was (by error) Cümart. After showing relevant documents, Swiss authorities changed the name back to Cömert.

- In a relationship with Alexandra
- His twin brother Jan plays for Jahn Regensburg in the 2nd German division
- Nico's family comes from Val Lumnezia in the canton of Grisons, he grew up in Greifensee, a few kilometers outside of Zurich

VARIA

- Nico's nickname is "kingfisher" (Eisvogel in German) and was «intenved» by his former coach André Schubert. "I like this nickname. I am not really nervous before kick-off, maybe a bit tense. But I stay cool in case of mistakes, they do not throw me off course."
- He once completed a commercial education while being at the academy of FC Zurich. He finished it at the offices of Borussia Mönchengladbach.
- Back from the times in Zurich, he knows and appreciates Djibril Sow
- His father Adrian who used to be his coach at FCZ academy is still working for the club as "Head of Préformation"
- Nico was a supporter of FC Zurich as a kid and admired Sergio Ramos
- He was participant of the Under-17 European championships 2013 and was later the captain of the Under-19
- 3 months after his debut for the Swiss Under-21 (in March 2016), Nico was called up for the national team for the first time

His cousins are Gelson Fernandes, Manuel Fernandes (former national player of Portugal) and Cabral (former Under-21 player of Switzerland). Elton Monteiro (Lausanne-Sport) and Ulisses Garcia (BSC Young Boys) are also akin to Edimilson Fernandes.




